Supporting Values: These values tend to be more subjective and are best discussed and defined at the town level.

These values, which will rarely be the sole or primary purpose for protecting a piece of land, are important considerations when combined with the primary values. The presence of a secondary value can also be a great opportunity to pull in additional partners, such as the local historic commission or recreation clubs.
